

## Message from the CEO

Warami marri yura - hello again everyone We hope you are all staying safe and well!

This issue of the Blackmail newsletter is acknowledging National Sorry Day, held annually on 26 May. This is a highly significant day for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples. For many it is a day of Mourning, particularly for Stolen Generations Survivors, their families and friends.

Sorry Day is also a time to pay tribute to the remarkable strength and resilience of our People and is a day to reflect on how we can contribute to a healing process between all communities. National Sorry Day is held the day before the Country begins the National Recognition Week. The week begins on 27 May to mark the anniversary of the 1967 referendum and ends on Mabo Day. National Recognition Week is designed to restore friendly relations between Aboriginal and non-Indigenous Peoples. In other words, a time for creating some positive outcomes by focusing on building relationships or partnerships between cultures.

In line with this plan for recognition, Blue Mountains Aboriginal Culture and Resource Centre (BMACRC) staff have been reaching out to non-Indigenous community organisations to find positive ways to work together. A recent Family Fun Day at Bullaburra was a great example of building partnerships, and we have some great photos of the event. continued...

Our ongoing connection with Gateway Family Services is another good example of the benefits of working in partnership with non-Indigenous organisations.

This partnership has led to new BMACRC programming called OUR PLACE for boys and in this issue of the Blackmail we include a story about the way OUR PLACE got started and the positive effects for Young Aboriginal Boys in the area.

We would love to see this program expanded to include a separate program for young Aboriginal girls' and we have begun re-connecting with Katoomba High School to design programs for older age groups. There are many schools across the mountains that we would like to work with, and this is why BMACRC has started a new Youth Traineeship. We hope to fill gaps in services for all youth and younger children to add to our existing Family Support. It is going to take some time to get youth programs running but I believe we are on the right track in our aims.

At present BMACRC Staff are looking at ways to support our Elders and broader community to attend much needed social activities. We are also remaining vigilant while COVID cases are still occurring in the Blue Mountains community. We recently supported the Katoomba TAFE Art Group with catering for their orientation day, we have held some nice hot lunches for our Elders with visits from the Blue Mountains and Nepean Local Health District Mootang Tarami wellbeing team. Interested Elders also attended a Seniors week celebration at Leura, so hopefully the issues that have postponed past events will begin to ease, and we can look forward to some fun activities for all ages into the future.

# **Message from the Board**

## AGM Addition for the Blackmail.

At the 2020 to 2021 Annual General Meeting held in March 2022 (delayed due to Covid) our members attended to give their opinions on matters that they wanted to put forward about our organisation. At times the AGM meeting became heated with passionate thoughts. We had some laughs, acknowledged some tears but it was abundantly clear that people care very much and have enthusiasm for our community and our small organisation.

Therefore, we are in this together and as Chair I believe we should be focusing on standing together as a community, holding each other up and working as a team to rebuild after several years of social isolation and environmental disasters have held us back. It is also important to remember that no one is perfect, so we should not hold people to standards that are impossible to achieve.

In this issue of the Blackmail the Board would also like to introduce Uncle Colin Locke and welcome him as a new board member. We feel lucky to have Uncle Colin because he has great experience working on Boards and working in community.

The board would also like to update the community on an agenda item that was raised at the AGM. The matter relates to our membership plan. At the AGM we discussed how BMACRC needs to send out almost 2 hundred notices to members for AGM meetings and many of the members on our list have either moved and /or not updated their details. Many have moved out of area and some people no longer wish to be members or are not active, which is a requirement for continuing membership. We explained how this is a huge unnecessary cost to BMACRC and that we would like to discuss and agree on some solutions. Some examples of actions we would like to take include: -

- Have potentially new members understand they do not need to be a member to use our services or attend our events.
- Our rule book states members need to be active for example, if they are unable to attend the AGM they can pass on their apologies.
- Another concern is people moving off the mountain. In our rule book they can continue to be a member if they still have a connection to the mountains. Being mindful that this again is the unwanted expense we need to address.

# Message from the Board (cont)

After discussing this issue with Oric and assessing the rule book, we have been advised that we can cancel memberships if there has been no correspondence after a certain amount of time or if we have 3 Return to senders. This also led us to discuss the following options. These include: -

We could write to the member and notify them that due to the specific reason and they would need to reply within a set amount of time, or they will be taken off the membership list. This would be a gentle process, clearly stating that they can then become a member again at any time in the future and reminding them that they are still welcome to use our services, attend events etc.

This process will then be documented, and their names will be added to the non-member list.

Also, at this time Associate members could be sent the notices, we would like to put it forward that these members are still welcome to attend but they will be invited through social media and the website.

We would also like to have a solid list of members who wish to receive their papers via email, this will be a documented procedure and can be changed anytime.

These procedures will also work for the Blackmail, asking people to let us know if and how they wish to receive the newsletter and how, by email or post. If we attempt to get this information, 3 times with no reply they would be taken off the list, but the same rules will apply, they can ask to be put back on at any time.

All of this may seem unnecessary, but we are on a great track, and we really want to be able to spend as much money on our programs as possible, Venessa is constantly applying for funding and the board are working with the staff to start cutting unnecessary costs down.

There was also a request for a quick write up on the board members. This will be worked over coming issues starting with Uncle Colin, our latest elected board member.

#### Hi Community

The need for transport is now increasing as we move well into the year and covid restrictions have eased. Our regular programs such as the Koori Play Group are back up and running so our bus is busy on Mondays.

We are also looking for a casual driver and we believe this would suit a retired person who would like a few hours work per week. The problem with finding a driver is that we can't be sure of the hours we have on offer. Some weeks we are overly busy with medical transport and events etc., and some weeks less so. Currently we only have one driver, which is Faye with me backfilling until we find another driver. This is tricky to because I have other work such as the reporting I must do in my job.

So, with that in mind, please remember to book any transport you may need, with a minimum of two working days' notice whenever possible. Booking early will really help us to provide better transport and when we do find a casual driver, we will be able to give them plenty of notice for their shifts. And if you need to cancel your journey, please remember to let us know as soon as possible and definitely before the driver turns up please, because we have to pay our drivers for a minimum of three hours.

The Family Fun Day saw BMACRC strengthening our partnerships with the Mountains Outreach Community Service (MOCS), Belong Blue Mountains and the Stronger Family Alliance (SFA). We came together this day during the Easter school holidays and there was plenty of food, cultural dance workshops and creative activities for children and parents alike.

There were up to 200 people in attendance over the day with a diversity of Aboriginal and non-Indigenous families coming together to share and learn about Culture and the local environment, while having fun and meeting new friends. We had over 30 evaluations filled out on the day so the next Family Fun Day will be even better!!

Our view is to try to provide as many activities as possible to reconnect our community, coming out of successive disasters including bush fires, floods and COVID lockdowns. We had a wonderful time at a Family excursion to the Hawkesbury show. We worked as a team to purchase tickets and organize transport. Some people made their own way there and feedback about the day has been good, although we were disappointed that we couldn't provide the lunch that we had planned, and we sincerely apologise for this.

A Family Support Worker is a focused role and as such Venessa Possum (CEO) will be prioritising the recruitment of a permanent worker. In the meantime, Venessa will happily backfill the position to ensure services. During this time the boys have learnt many very important cultural values including how to be respectful, patient, and humble within all walks of life.

The boys have made tangible cultural items such as spears with blunt ends and clay weights, rope making using stringy bark, and clap sticks and they have learnt cultural painting in various forms, traditional song, and language along with stories from our Old People with the theme of looking after one and other. OUR PLACE has also been a fulfilling experience for me watching the boys develop and grow within their culture.

We would love to thank the team at Gateway Family Services for making this partnership possible and an absolute delight to take part in. We are hopeful that in the near future there will be a similar group and program for young ladies to be led by a female BMACRC worker. # A partnership Built on Mutual Respect

Over the past few years the partnership between Gateway and BMACRC has been growing and deepening. We have run arts based groups together, consulted with each other and shared spaces and resources. The Our Place group is a wonderful example of the benefits of working together.

OUR PLACE is a group for boys that meets once a month providing opportunities for the boys to learn about local Culture, through art, music, tool making, storytelling and other hands on activities. The groups support the boys to explore their own identity and sense of belonging while connecting with County, Culture and positive male role models.

BMACRC has the Cultural expertise and knowledge that is core to this program. Uncle Lex facilitates the group with the help of Elders such as Uncle Ed as an respected Elder and Shaun O'Bryan, a young Gamillaroi man learning on the job.


Kathie O'Connor from Gateway brings her expertise in child development and Clinical Practice. Supporting the male facilitators quietly in the background Kathie has been able to identify the special support needs of children in the group. Keeping families connected to the group is an important element of the groups' success. Gateway manages registrations, lets families know when it's on and sends out individual photo collections each week so the boys can see themselves engaging in culture and community (so important for developing a positive sense of identity).

One of the key themes that is repeated throughout the group is Respect. Our Place is a partnership built on respect. Working together has been such a rewarding experience, we are constantly learning from each other, solving problems together and sharing different perspectives.

## **Uncle Colin Locke**



My name is Uncle Colin Locke. I was born in Katoomba and have spent my entire life living here, in what can only be described as paradise. I am an Elder of the Dharug Community which encompasses the entire Greater Sydney Basin.

My previous working background has been as a Fitter & Machinist, Toolmaker, Diesel Technician with Freight Rail and as a Customer Service Officer in Centrelink. I was recently employed by NSW Health as an Aboriginal Mental Health Clinician for the past twenty years after completing my Degree in Aboriginal Mental Health in Wagga Wagga. I have now been retired from this position for the past two years.

Since retiring, I have worked with Muru Mittigar as Cultural Advisor by talking to schools, visiting inmates at Parklea Correctional Centre, conducting Smoking Ceremonies and Welcome to Country invitations. I am also a member of the NSW Cancer Council Reconciliation Action Plan.

Currently I am on the Board of Directors for BMACRC, a position that I also filled many years ago. I now look forward to serving the Aboriginal community of Blue Mountains and beyond.
