

Managers Message

Hello and welcome to September and the lovely warmer weather that this month is going to bring. The month of September is a very exciting time for ACRC and the youth here in the Blue Mountains and some surrounding areas. The new program will cater for Aboriginal youth between the ages of 15 to 22 years of age both male and female. The program will be designed to give youth the chance to connect to country, followed by a one day deadly thinking program where the youth will be given tools and opportunities to help deal with hard issues such as anxiety, depression Alcohol and other drugs and suicide prevention. We at ACRC are really excited to deliver this new program and we aim to be able to deliver this program, along with many more programs to all community members of all ages in the future. ACRC have been restricted for many years now in how we can deliver a service, due to funding guidelines, which has limited us as an organisation and as a culturally safe service. Up until June 30th this year ACRC were only funded to cater for 0-5 years (ACYFS) and 50+ under the CHSP funding agreement, which as you would all be aware truly restricted us on delivering programs to the Aboriginal community holistically. This is why ACRC gaining the new funding for 15 to 22 years is a big deal and a great success story. Given the restrictions that ACRC have been bound by, it is pertinent as to why we are striving to gain more funding so that we can cater for the whole community and not just sections. To serve community with this holistic approach is something that management and all staff wish to be able to achieve in the near future. This is why we worked hard to become a registered NDIS provider, being the only Aboriginal organisation in the Blue Mountains to obtain the NDIS registration. Once again we became certified so that ACRC will now be able to deliver services to Aboriginal people with a disability that are on the NDIS and in the Blue Mountains. By becoming a NDIS service provider ACRC will be able to grow as an organisation and therefore this will give us the capacity to be able to deliver more of a holistic approach to many more Aboriginal people within the community. I will finish and thank all the community who support ACRC, I would also like to thank the current board and other previous board members for all their hard work as well as thank my staff for their dedication and hard work in helping make ACRC a place where we all strive together so that in the future we will be able to serve all community members no matter what age or gender.

Gateway Family Services has invited friends at the Aboriginal Cultural Resource Centre located in Katoomba, Australia to partner with the Hatutan Foundation, Dili, East Timor.

Together, we have crafted an engaging cultural exchange that showcases the collective histories of the "Big Country" and the "Little Country" through revered oral traditions, languages and shared common values that still resonate across the Timor Sea today.

The cultural study tour will include four wheel driving to sacred 30,000 year old rock art sites, lighting candles at monuments to remember the struggles of Timorese independence and social events with traditional dances, music and art. There is then the chance for discussions on modern issues concerning youth. Whether we are from the 'Big Country' or the 'Little Country', the challenges of education, employment, crime and relationships are all too real. It is through these conversations, that we are reminded we are not alone and that we have much to share with others who have less.

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


Free Complementary Therapies treatment sessions at Blue Mountains Women's Health and Resource Centre



Blue Periwinkle

Vinca major



Periwinkle is a vine that has a woody crown bearing runners up to 1 m long. The root system is hardy and fibrous, forming a mat 15–30 cm deep in the soil.

Leaves are large (15–60 mm long, 14–45 mm wide) with stalks and opposite. Each pair of leaves is generally at right angles to those above and below. The upper leaf surface is glossy and there are generally very short hairs along the leaf margins.

Flowers are large, 30–40 mm across and blue-purple or sometimes white, with five lobes from a basal tube 16–17 mm long. They are borne on upright stems to 50 cm long mainly in spring to summer.

Periwinkle covers the ground smothering all other plants and therefore impedes regeneration.

Hand removal of very small patches (less than 1 m square) can be dug up. Follow-up treatments will be required. Stem and root fragments can re-sprout, so all plant material needs to be removed or spread out to dry off the ground.
