

- This course is for people who may be required to prepare for and provide a first aid response in locations beyond the reach of timely medical assistance.
- You will learn how to respond in a remote emergency situation, apply appropriate first aid procedures, manage the incident and evaluate your own performance.

Camphor Laurel - noxious weed

Cinnamomum camphora

Large evergreen tree up to 20m with grey/brown bark with deep vertical cracks; poisonous. Leaves are light green and glossy with waved edges and yellow veins. Twigs are often red. Flowers in spring with small white flowers and fruit ripens in autumn/early winter, (small black berries). Seed is spread from birds and possums after they ingest the fruit. Camphor Laurel invades bushland displacing natives and creates a dense shade. Camphor Laurel is difficult to control and should be treated with tree injections. Small seedlings can be hand-pulled, saplings can be treated by stripping and painting with herbicide. If removing from steep slopes or waterways please seek advice from the Blue Mountains City Council.
