

**Common Names: Wombat Berry, Orange Vine** 

Scientific Name: Eustrephus latifolius

Synonyms: Eustrephus angustifolius, Eustrephus brownii

**Family: ASPARAGACEAE** 



Wombat berry (Eustrephus latifolius) is a tuberous-rooted, evergreen, twinning or multi-stemmed scrambling vine reaching 6m high on suitable trellis. It may scramble and form a clump 3m across when grown without support. People have eaten the small underground tubers of Eustrephus latifolius both raw or baked. The tubers of Wombat Berry are reported to have a sweet earthy flavour when eaten raw.
